## European Union Overwhelmingly votes in favour of reducing plastics

The annual 4 year survey of wild tigers in India has reported that there about now 2,967 tigers in the country. This is up by 74%, as the numbers of tigers in 2010 was only 1,706. Nepal has also achieved a rise and now has 235 tigers, up 94% from 121 in 2010.

This wonderful news has been achieved by the hard work of wildlife patrols, less habitat destruction and a ban on the hunting of tigers.

The European parliament has voted to ban single-use plastic cutlery, cotton buds, straws and stirrers as part of a sweeping law against plastic waste that spoils beaches and pollutes oceans. The vote by the members, means that there will be an end to the manufacture of single use plastics by the end of 2021.

By the end of 2025, it will be law that plastic bottles contain at least 25% recycled material and by 2029, 90% of the bottle is made from recycled plastics. Countries in Europe will also put a ban on disposable cups and containers in cafes, and instead asking customers to use their own coffee cups and boxes for takeaway sandwiches- or accept paper bags for food instead. What a great start to making a change this Earth Week!
